On a special occasion Helen and I might ask one another if we want to "make a day of it". This is our code for buying an overpriced coffee based beverage from one of the chain coffee shops. In the autumn that might be a pumpkin spiced latte and in the summer a

frappuccino. Alas the best purveyors of frappuccinos (AMT and Pret) no longer sell them and we find the other chains too weak, too sweet or a combination of both. And so we set ourselves to producing our own.

Ingredients:

Espresso (two per person, or at a pinch instant coffee made up with a tiny amount of boiling water)

Milk (as much as you normally like)

Ice (equal to the same amount of water you would add if you were turning your espressos into an americanos) Xanthan gum (1/4 tsp per person. Irreplaceable, this is what prevents the drink from splitting and provides a light fluffy texture. Available form health food shops) Flavouring and sweeteners (sugar, vanilla extract, cocoa. Add to your taste).

Add all the ingredients and blend for about 30 seconds. A few pulses at the start help to break larger chunks of

-- PEN PORTRAIT: SARAH MCDERMOTT--

Sarah's vouthful appearance belies the years of hard work and dedication she has given to the local community, notably as a Wandsworth Councillor and school inspector and governor. She chose to read Law at Exeter University, rightly thinking that it would provide useful background knowledge in a wide variety of jobs. She also spent a lot of time organising events for the Exeter University Riding Club, in this country and abroad. From 1987 several years were devoted to raising three children,



during which period she completed an Open University course on Women in Management.

Sarah grew up in Worcestershire alongside three brothers. Their father was a farmer. Their mother was artistic and painted scenery for the local amateur dramatic society, and threw herself into various community activities. Small wonder that their sons' jobs are associated with farming and horticulture (plus running a pub) and that Sarah became committed to her own local community. Her husband, Evelyn, was a Councillor in Wandsworth for eight years and then, after another four years, Sarah took up the baton for sixteen years and retired in 2022.

Sarah was motivated by her desire to being, in her own words, "a busybody", attending to the needs of local people and the urban environment. Most of us have seen Sarah patrolling the Ward over the years - even helping the police to detect speeding motorists - with Sam the dog in tow. She enjoyed meeting people on their doorsteps. She was keen to monitor the Council's finances and to make sure that our money was spent prudently and efficiently. She put herself in a strong position by joining five committees successively, three of which she chaired. At the same time, she served on the governing bodies of several schools. Until 2016, Sarah had spent over twenty years as a freelance school inspector, clocking up hundreds of inspections and resolving complaints between schools and inspection teams.

Now retiring from public duties, both Sarah and Evelyn look forward to moving to Worcestershire. We have appreciated Sarah's work as church
